Menstrual hygiene management in humanitarian emergencies

FPA Sri Lanka donated a truck load of sanitary napkins to the young girls and women in 6 quarantine facilities across the country through the Family Health Bureau and armed forces. This activity was conduced under the IPPF SPRINT Project.

The current health crisis may have left women and girls without access to clean and safe sanitary products. This can be due to the lack of availability, the lack of funds and the travel restrictions imposed currently. As a result, women and girls maybe forced to use improvised, methods to manage their periods, including torn pieces of clothing or rags. These alternative methods used by women and girls to manage their periods are often ineffective, uncomfortable and unhygienic. They can lead to dangerous infections, and blood stains which can cause women and girls to feel embarrassed and isolated during their period. Meeting the Sexual and Reproductive Health Needs in a crisis is paramount. FPA Sri Lanka wants to ensure that everyone, no matter when and where, has the opportunity to maintain good sexual and reproductive health.

FPA Sri Lanka's online platform to help young people navigate life, love and relationships

FPA Sri Lanka's Happy Life Centre launched their new and improved website on the 31st of January 2020 in the presence of the FPASL's President, Mr. Chandima Gunawardena, Dr. Lasantha Malavige (Chairperson – Medical Technical Advisory Committee) and the Senior Management Team. It was carried out under the purview of the Medical Unit. The website found on **www.happylife.lk** is specifically designed with youth in mind, to provide a gamut of information on a variety of sexual, reproductive and general health issues and topics. With 1.8 billion youth aged 10 to 24 alive right now, it's the largest global population of youth in history! In the course of their transition to adulthood, young people have to make certain decisions that will have a significant impact on their lives.

Far too many young people face barriers to reproductive health information and care. Even those able to find accurate information about their health and rights may be unable to access the services needed to protect their health. Young people's sexual and reproductive health must be supported. It also means empowering young people to know and exercise their rights.

On this exciting occasion, Executive Director, Ms. Thushara Agus had this to say: "How can you have a happy life with a lot of question marks on a critical area of your personal life and not knowing whom to turn to for answers? A lot of us waded through our young days without a full understanding of our Sexual and Reproductive Health and Rights and made choices based on the limited knowledge we possessed. Today, FPA Sri Lanka is pleased to help you with these answers which can be only a call or a text away. And we do it in a right-based, non-discriminatory manner. The Happy Life site facilitates interaction with a Healthcare professional, either a doctor or a counsellor for your very specific problem. It promotes Sexual and Reproductive Health and overall wellbeing of the young and not-so-young people of our country. It is heartening to note that some clients who are reaching out to us, do so, even when they employed overseas".

Dr. Nuzrath Nasoordeen, Deputy Director Medical said "our expectation is to see an increase of young people visiting our site for information and knowledge. As Happy Life provides scientific information without biases, its intention is to clear doubts and empower the client/user to make informed choices on their Sexual and Reproductive Health and Rights. We want to thank and acknowledge Dr. Lasantha Malavige (Chairperson, Medical TAC), Dr. Sankha Randeniya (Member, Medical TAC) and Dr. Yakandawala (Former Director Medical) for their technical support towards creating this website".



Maternal mortality refers to deaths due to complications from pregnancy or childbirth.

Skilled care before, during and after childbirth can save the lives of women and newborns.

Progress in Maternal and Child Health in Sri Lanka

With the passing of a resolution on congenital anomalies at the sixty-third World Health Assembly (2010), Sri Lanka began creating a national initiative for the surveillance, prevention and care of congenital defects before and after birth. In Sri Lanka, around 360,000 pregnancies are registered every year, and approximately 328,000 babies are born alive. Out of them, 5,800 are born with a birth defect; 30% of whom have a severe defect that affects their day to day life. Nearly 650 of these babies die before their first birthday – making birth defects the second leading cause of infant mortality in Sri Lanka.

Additionally, 1,900 babies die in-utero after 28 weeks of gestation (i.e. are stillbirth), and approximately 35% die due to a birth defect. The visibility of birth defects as a leading cause of morbidity and mortality is limited in all parts of the world, especially in developing countries. Therefore, sharing knowledge on preventing birth defects and how to improve the health and quality of life of those affected is critical. This information should be universally available, in every country and every social group. Efforts to implement existing prevention and care measures should be accelerated in all regions of the world.

With the support of WHO South-East Asia Regional Office (SEARO) and the WHO Country Office, Sri Lanka put together its first Strategic Plan on Births Defects. WHO also supported the country in conducting case surveillance using a web-based system, building capacity on surveillance, and increasing the prevention and control of birth defects. A web-based, real-time, birth defects surveillance system, which guides interventions is now available. Dr Kapila Jayaratne, National Programme Manager, Maternal and Child Morbidity & Mortality Surveillance, Family Health Bureau in a statement said "Sri Lanka has many areas for improvement. Other countries offer termination of pregnancies on the grounds of lethal congenital deformities, which is a progressive stance that Sri Lanka could take. Through the web-based system, we are expecting valuable data that will guide our practices and inform our programmes and policies. I would say in 10 years, we will be wellpositioned to prevent birth defects".



Gender Equality Policy

Gender equality is a human right. It is especially important for a rights-based, gender transformative organization like FPA Sri Lanka to ensure that the needs, rights and experiences of individuals involved with FPA Sri Lanka are reflected in policies and processes, and that they are supported to play an equal role at FPA Sri Lanka.

The Gender Equality Policy provides a set of guiding principles that reflect FPA Sri Lanka's commitment to advancing gender equality and the actions necessary to realize the goal. Following its commitment to a human rights framework which prohibits any discrimination, exclusion or restriction on the basis of sex, age, gender, gender Identity, sexual orientation, marital status, physical and mental disability or health status, this policy clearly delineates requirements to be adhered to, which will ensure that all individuals, who identify as women, men, lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender or intersex, have access to equality of outcome in the workplace and in programmes. The Policy will be circulated to all staff, volunteers, clients and partners of the Association.

Beyond 2025" Symposium - Ensuring a Sustainable and Fully-Funded National HIV Response



"Beyond 2025" symposium held on the 19th of February 2020, was a platform to discuss the shared responsibility of civil society, especially including key populations, key population led and serving organizations, government, private sector and other stakeholders in reaching zero new HIV infections, zero AIDS related deaths, zero stigma and discrimination, achievement of undetectable viral load among all people living with HIV and making available all possible HIV prevention tools for populations who are vulnerable to HIV in Sri Lanka, especially in the context of Global Fund to Fight AIDS, Tuberculosis and Malaria transitioning out of Sri Lanka.

The symposium aimed to bring together community representatives, advocates and activists, government officials, representatives from non-governmental organizations, representatives from UN agencies and from other stake holders to discuss futuristic approaches to ensure a sustainable and a fully funded national HIV response, broker partnerships and foster a shared responsibility to tackle challenges that impede a robust, comprehensive and an inclusive national HIV response. The symposium was organized by CARE Consortium (Young Out Here, National Transgender Network and Diversity and Solidarity Trust) in collaboration with the Country Coordinating Mechanism Sri Lanka and supported by APCASO.

Ms. Thushara Agus – Executive Director, The Family Planning Association of Sri Lanka was part of the opening Plenary "Sri Lanka National HIV Response – Here and Now" and served as the Moderator for the panel discussion 'Fostering Collaborations and Partnerships for a Sustainable and Fully–Funded National HIV Response'. Mr. Sriyal Nilanka – FPA Sri Lanka's AFAO Programme Officer was also a panellist.

FPA Sri Lanka is a key player in partnership with The National STD/AIDS Control Programme (NSACP), Ministry of Health, spearheading the national response to end HIV/AIDS in Sri Lanka by 2025.

Particularly through our Sustainability of Key Populations in Asia (AFAO SKPA) Project funded by the multi-country Global Fund Grant, the aim is to promote sustainable services for key population members, scale-up of outreach work and improve key population members' access to prevention, testing and treatment and retention in the service cascade.

As the Global Fund to Fight AIDS, Tuberculosis and Malaria intends transitioning out of Sri Lanka in 2022, securing the long-term sustainability of service delivery for key populations at national level by exploring innovative approaches and identifying alternative sources of funding for key programmes is paramount.

They also had preliminary discussions to explore a few more products to be included to FPASL's product portfolio. Ms. Thushara Agus – Executive Director joined the meeting via Skype and briefed the officials from Gedeon Richter Plc about the history of the Association, work currently being carried out and about the future plans for development.

During the visit, the FPASL team were able to witness the manufacturing plant and packaging unit of Gedeon Richter Plc. They reported that Gedeon Richter Plc has now overcome the slowdown in production due to the introduction of the serialization process and are back on track with regular production. It was evident that Gedeon Richter Plc maintains very high standards in production and the company employees more than 12,000 employees including 1,000 employees only in R&D.





In conversation with Dr.Nusrath Nasoordeen – Deputy Director Medical

Describe your career path to this point at FPA Sri Lanka.

After my internship at the Batticaloa Teaching Hospital, I did my post internship as an additional Medical Officer of Health in Siyabalanduwa, Monaragala for over three years. I then served at the General Hospital Ratnapura for a very short period. Following that, I resigned from government practice and worked in a private hospital for yet another year and then joined the PG diploma course in Venereology, PGIM. I have also worked at a private hospital in Oman before joining FPASL.

What do you find most rewarding about this job?

We invest quality time to talk to people by providing counselling and Sexual Reproductive Health (SRH) information at our clinic, over the phone (through our helpline), social media, etc. Our setting is highly confidential and is youth and gender friendly, so there is a high acceptance for our services. Just seeing our clients' needs fulfilled and satisfied is truly rewarding.

Most of the health issues with regard to SRH are highly stigmatized in Sri Lanka, and one of our goals is to de-stigmatize this notion. This truly is also rewarding.

Was there a defining moment when you just knew you wanted to be a physician?

A physician should possess human skills, have to have the ability to relate to others and have patience. Among friends and family, I have been told at a very young age that I should become a physician as they believed I had these skills. So there wasn't a defining moment really, but a cluster of incidents that made me choose this path.

Do you have a specific memory of an outcome with a patient that you are exceptionally proud of, or happy with?

Yes, there have been many moments, especially one specific incident which happened a year ago with one of our sub-fertility clients (female) who due to the delay in conceiving was facing marital issues. This patient was depressed and through intense counselling and proper medical care she eventually conceived and her mental health was also controlled. This was a team effort that led to an overall successful outcome.

What are the most common reproductive health services that are accessed by clientele that visit the clinic?

This would be the 'Well Woman Screening clinics' that aids in cancer screening and our sub-fertility management services.

Any new areas of focus for FPA and the Centre for Family Health in the year 2020?

The re-launch and revamp of the Happy Life website, which has new and modern features that facilitates easy access to information and advice on all matters relating to sexual and reproductive health. We are also planning to use social media as a platform of communication to reach out to all age categories in Sri Lanka. This we find is, key to awareness among the youth.

On a more personal note, what advice do you have for our readers?

SRH leads to various medical and mental issues, therefore, it is vital for all to have accurate SRH information. Providing such information and making it easily available and accessible, is our responsibility. When you encounter a person with SRH related issues, it is important that you direct them to health care providers that have the knowledge and expertise in dealing with it. One must aim to de-stigmatize these issues in your home and in the educational realm. Education is the primary source of eliminating mental health issues with regard to SRH.

My next advice is to mention that there are new medical technologies, facilities and expertise to aid SRH related issues, therefore, everyone who requires these services must seek help without fear or shame.

DIGITAL VIOLENCE AGAINST WOMEN

Digital violence against women in Sri Lanka is exponentially on the rise and it can be classified into numerous forms such as Sexual Harassment, Character Assassinations and Blackmailing.

As per the comprehensive definition introduced by the task force appointed to look into sexual harassment in the US military academies sometime back, communication of vulgar jokes and offensive stories of sexual exploits, repeated and unwanted propositions for dates or sex amount to sexual harassment. There are thousands of fake account operators who have mastered the art of identifying vulnerable females through social media for sexual exploitation. If a lady responds either to an E-mail or a Facebook message coming from a fake account she is assured of becoming prey of such predators in the long run.

Cultural attributes also have completely changed during the last two decades with the digital revolution. Unlike in the western world, having pre-marital sex was not entertained by the female partner in a romantic relationship, as virginity of a bride was an issue and a social concern in our culture. An accidental pregnancy is the worst nightmare to be experienced by an unmarried girl, a few decades ago. However, increased awareness and availability of protective measures has gradually liberated the younger generations to enjoy fully fledged sex at an age it is most pleasurable and enjoyable.

In order to justify this with an example, about three decades ago, the maximum a couple in a relationship would have done is going to see a film.

Instead, in the present context, they will go to a hotel room. However, what they do not realise is that in such unknown places the act they perform may be either observed or recorded by others using hidden sophisticated digital cameras that cannot be spotted. Police recently arrested the owner of a guest house in Colombo, who had rented a specific room fitted with digital video cameras and showed the couple performing to a clientele of his living overseas, through the internet, live.

A recent trend has emerged through YouTube channels to character assassinate ladies who are either VIPs or celebrities. Up to now, no such victims have ever attempted to confront such attacks leveled at them. These videos are being observed by hundred thousands of people and the sole objective of the masterminds behind this is to generate income with the number of viewers. The evolution of the Smart Phone has further aggravated the situation. When an intimate relationship strengthens among two individuals, most often the male may request the female to expose her body, while they are in a telephone conversation. This is where the young girls make a fundamental mistake, based on trust. Once that is done, she may be on record at the other end. In the event of a breakup of the relationship, there is a very likely chance that the angry partner may threaten to upload them into the internet and expose the girl. Also, there always is a possibility of the boy showing it to his friends.

A few months back, a lady lawyer took selfies of herself with her own smart phone to see how beautiful she is. A few weeks later, the phone broke down and she gave it to a repair centre. The owners of these mobile repair centres are aware of the fact that people have confidential information in phones and found the photographs of the naked lady who handed over the phone for repair. They called her and demanded money, not to upload them onto the internet. However, the lady acted prudently, complained to the police and got the culprits apprehended. This is why a lady must refrain from exposing her body to a camera under any circumstances, even her own.

A few years back, a young girl going to the dressing room of a dress shop was recorded by the owner of the dress shop from a camera hidden in it. Later, he blackmailed her and the girl was compelled to accede to the demands. When, the harassment became unbearable and intolerable, she informed her brother. The brother and a friend pulled the dress shop owner out and assassinated the man in broad daylight, in a busy suburban town.

In summary, there are women who fall victim of such circumstances that they cannot even go and complain to the Police.

Therefore, either the Police Department or the Women's Bureau must endeavor to set up a special unit comprising authoritative female officers to listen to such pathetic exposures of digital violence faced by women to redress their grievances and take remedial action in a manner that the dignity and the identity of the lady is protected.

Also, the government must introduce new legislation to curtail the digital character assassination leveled at women.

Stress - a modern buzzword?!!

Stress is a contemporary, widely used buzzword that's used to describe the feelings of "distress" experienced when tension, pressure or even boredom are perceived to become unbearable; beyond our ability to cope!

The signs and symptoms for each and every one of us will vary and also depend largely on how well you manage your stress. The key is knowing that there can be serious health risks if stress becomes chronic (long-term and un-managed). Your aim should be to achieve and maintain an equilibrium that feels comfortable for you. You should be actively doing something to reduce, prevent and manage stress in your life to stop it becoming chronic. The Alokaya Counselling Centre carried out a Stress Management Workshop on the 7th of February 2020 at Camso Loadstar (Pvt) Ltd, Ekala.

Capacity building through training!



A ToT (Training of Trainer) on Disaster Management and Sexual and Reproductive Health in Emergencies (SRHiE) was conducted under the SPRINT Project on 22nd - 24th January 2020, at the National Institute of Health Sciences (NIHS), Kalutara. Participants were Trainers (Special tutors in Public Health/ Public Health Nursing Nursing Grade Tutors/ Regional Supervisory Public Health Nursing Officers) of the Part II, Midwifery Training Course. The objective of this programme was to build capacity of these trainers to educate Public Health Midwife students on Disaster Management and SRHiE which will be introduced as new modules in the upcoming PHM curriculum. (A Public Health Midwife -PHM is the key health care provider at the domiciliary level in the Sri Lankan health care system.)

Dr. Harischandra Yakandawala, SPRINT Consultant, facilitated this training. The introduction of these new modules is being carried out by FPA Sri Lanka and the Disaster Preparedness and Response Division, Ministry of Health (DPRD) in consultation with the Education, Training and Research Unit (ETR), Ministry of Health.
