Building Inclusive SRH Education

As part of the French Embassy-funded Inclusive Health Project, FPA signed an MoU with the South Asian Center for Teacher Development (SACTD) to advance SRH rights and address GBV among persons with disabilities. The partnership will develop accessible CSE training and resources in Braille, large print and audio formats.



Strengthening Partnerships with Dealers

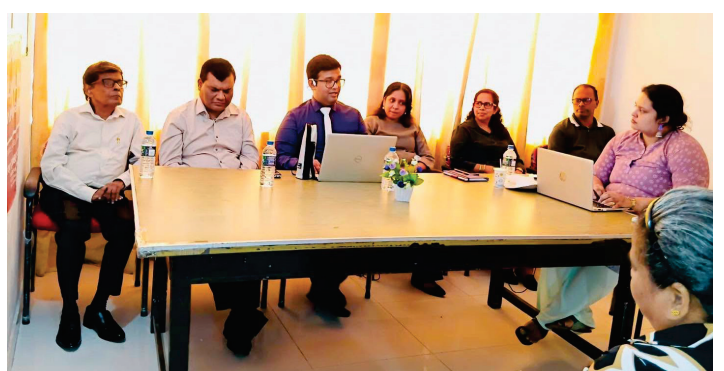
Preparing Youth for SRH in Emergencies

Twenty-five young participants joined a two-day training under the IPPF SPRINT Project on 22–23 August. The programme strengthened knowledge of emergency preparedness, SRH needs during crises, and the role young people can play in building resilient communities.



Strengthening Frontline Response to SRH Emergencies

A two-day Minimum Initial Service Package (MISP) training for sub-national first-line medical staff in Kandy strengthened preparedness to deliver essential SRH services during emergencies. Conducted under the IPPF SPRINT Project, the training focused on MISP objectives and the critical role of frontline healthcare workers.



Breaking the Silence, Building Inclusion

FPA Sri Lanka launched its partnership with the Sri Lanka National Federation of the Visually Handicapped through the Breaking the Silence project. The initiative promotes accessible SRH education, counselling and informed decision-making for blind and visually impaired individuals, with a focus on dignity, privacy and inclusion.



Taking Health Services and Awareness Closer to Communities

The Koggala SDP conducted an outreach programme at Brandix Apparel Solutions, connecting employees with confidential SRH services, counselling, education and awareness programmes. In Kilinochchi, the SDP partnered with NAQDA for a GBV awareness session with the Akkarayankulam fishing community, encouraging dialogue and challenging harmful attitudes.



Starting Conversations That Matter

Our Moneragala and Seethawaka SDPs recently conducted CSE programmes for young people, covering SRH, HIV/STIs, counselling and life skills. The sessions encouraged open conversations, informed choices and proactive health-seeking, with HIV screening also offered to participants in Moneragala.
